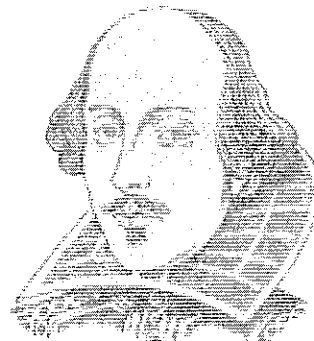

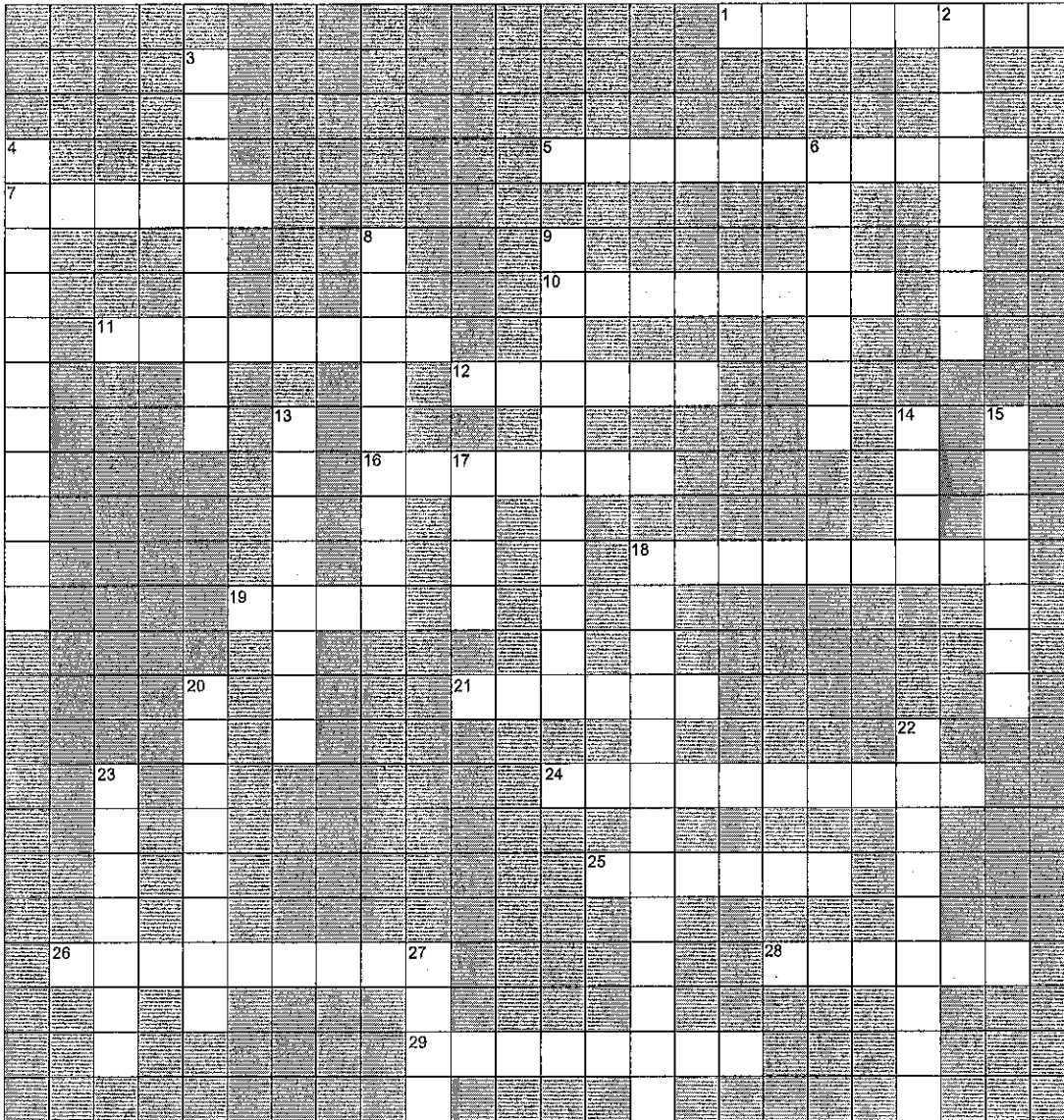
Shakespearean Quotes Matching Game
