TDA Response: Title, Date, Name, Pages read

Paragraph Two: State an opinion based on pages read, then support the opinion with text evidence using direct quotes.

- Kinds of Sentences-Write three sentences for each using the correct punctuation: Declarative (use a period), Exclamatory (Use an exclamation point), Interrogative (use a question mark)
- Discover two of each kind of sentence in literature of choice-identify the source, write the sentences using proper grammar and spelling.
- Copy and label three sentences using text of choice:  
Label nouns, verbs, adjectives, articles, conjunctions
