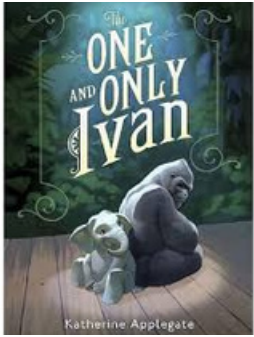

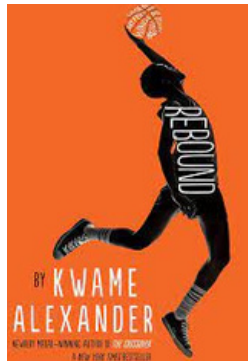

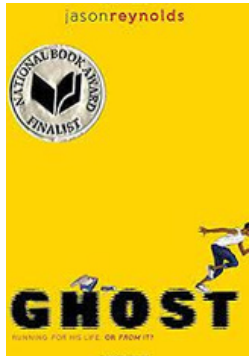
**The One and Only Ivan** by Katherine Applegate *(This book is part of a series.)*

But when he meets Ruby, a baby elephant taken from the wild, he is forced to see their home, and his art, through new eyes.



**Rebound** by Kwame Alexander *(This book is part of a series.)*

Before Josh and Jordan Bell were streaking up and down the court, their father was learning his own moves. Chuck Bell takes center stage as readers get a glimpse of his childhood and how he became the jazz music worshipping, basketball star his sons look up to.



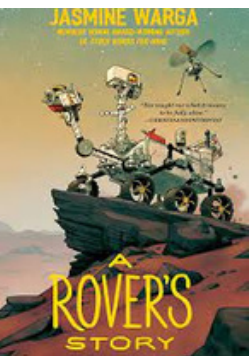
**Ghost** by Jason Reynolds

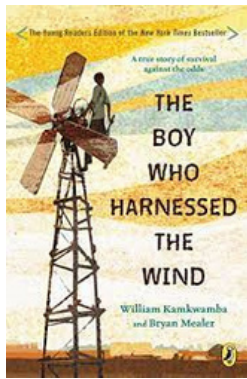

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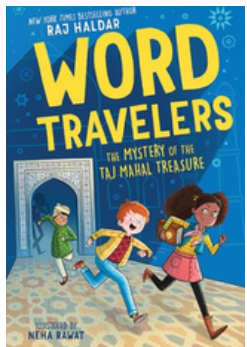
**Sisters: A Graphic Novel by Raina Telgemeier** (*This book is part of a series.*)

Their relationship doesn't improve much over the years, but when a baby brother enters the picture and later, something doesn't seem right between their parents, they realize they must figure out how to get along. **The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind by William Kamkwamba**

When a terrible drought struck William Kamkwamba's tiny village in Malawi, his family lost all of the season's crops, leaving them with nothing to eat and nothing to sell. 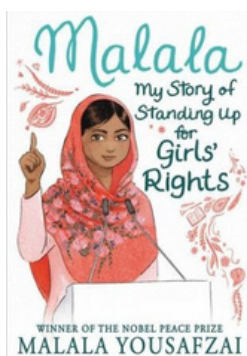
**World Travelers and the Taj Mahal Mystery by Raj Haldar**

**Malala: My Story of Standing Up for Girls' Rights by Malala Yousafzai**

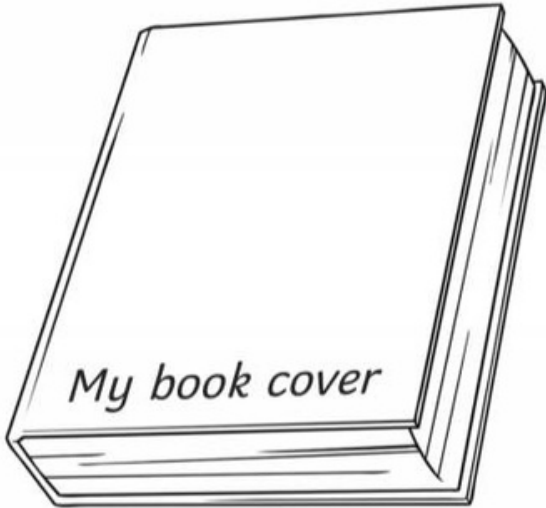

# Active Reading Strategies



<b>Predict</b>	Try to figure out what information will come next and how the selection might end.
<b>Visualize</b>	Imagine the images you see as the author describes them. Use the details from the text to create a visual image.
<b>Clarify</b>	Summarize/explain what you have read.
<b>Question</b>	Ask questions about the text.
<b>Connect</b>	Connect personally with what you are reading. Think of similarities between the descriptions in the text selection and what you have personally experienced, seen, heard, or previously read.
<b>Evaluate</b>	Form opinions about what you've read.
